

The number of BSFT, FCU, FFT, HFW, or MST teams serving each locality as of June 2024





Expiration of Pandemic Relief

In 2021, stimulus payments, in conjunction with other relief measures, spurred the largest one-year drop in child poverty on record.

In 2022, the expiration of that aid led to a historic increase in child poverty. As a result, 5 million more children lived in poverty in 2022 compared to 2021 (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, June 2024).

Expanded benefits provided in Virginia ended in the first half of 2023.

Important Changes to Benefit Programs

Federal and state benefit programs that provided temporary eligibility and enrollment procedures due to the COVID-19 pandemic will begin returning to regular operations over the coming months. These programs will have specific requirements and unique timeframes for returning to pre-pandemic services.

WHAT does this program do?	The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) provides monthly food benefits to eligible households and individuals. SNAP emergency aliotments were a temporary federal benefit provided to active SNAP households.	The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) for college students provides monthly benefits to eligible college students. Eligibility was temporarily expanded to allow greater participation by students enrolled at least half-time in an institution of higher education.	The Medicald and Family Access to Medical Insurance Security Plan (FAMIS) programs provide medical and dental health care coverage to eligible children, adults and families. Participants were provided continuous coverage during the previous period and were not required to submit for annual renewal of benefits.	The Temporary Cash Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program provides monthly cash payments to eligible households. TANF families were temporarily provided benefits beyond the usual 24- and 60-month limits. Requirements for the Virginia initiative for Education and Work (VIEW) program were also walved. This program supplemented school meals that students missed while schools were closed or placed on part-time schedules due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Increased Parental/Family Stress

Parents and caregivers have been consistently more likely to report experiencing high levels of stress compared to other adults.

33% of parents reported high levels of stress in the past month (Aug. 2024) compared to 20% of other adults.

When stress is severe and/or prolonged, it can have harmful effects on the mental health of parents and caregivers.

Parents and caregivers today face tremendous and unique pressures!



The Opioid Crisis

Local departments of social services continue to be disproportionately impacted by the opioid crisis; they are struggling with the increase in cases resulting from parental death and substance-exposed children entering foster care in their communities.

About 30% of foster care cases are related to parental drug abuse. The trend seems to be growing.

^{2 &#}x27;Opioids Unspecified' are a small category of deaths in which the determination of heroin and/or one or more prescription opioids cannot be made due to specific circumstances of the death. Most commonly, these circumstances are a result of death several days after an overdose, in which the OCME cannot test for toxicolog because the substances have been metabolized out of the decedent's system.

Other Considerations for Increased Foster Care Numbers

Relief of Custody:

Local departments of social services across the state have seen an increase in the use of "relief of custody" to deal with a troubled teen or child which often results in entry into foster care and increased caseloads (Final Report of the Commission on Youth, 2023).

Kinship:

While there has been an increase of children entering care, there has also been an increase of children entering foster care being placed in kinship foster homes.

The kinship rate in Virginia has increased due to concentrated efforts in placing children with kin or fictive kin – especially within the last year due to Kin First Now.

Workforce:

Currently, there is a shortage of child welfare workers, which is a cause of high caseloads (Final Report of the Commission on Youth, 2023).

Provisional Childcare Licenses and the Impact on Title IV-E Funding

Title IV-E Guidance 1.7.1.4 Childcare

- Title IV-E funds can be used for childcare when the childcare is provided in a legally operating facility or home that provides daily supervision.
- Title IV-E funds are <u>not</u> allowable for a provisionally licensed childcare facility.



Child Welfare Manual 8.3A.8c Title IV-E, Foster Care Maintenance Payments

Question:

• Can a State claim title IV-E reimbursement for an eligible child placed in a child-care institution that has a provisional license? Can the State claim title IV-E if the childcare institution has a probationary license due to a violation of State procedures?

Answer:

• If a child-care institution is granted a provisional license or placed on probationary status due to its failure to fully satisfy all of the State's licensing standards, then children placed in such facility are not eligible for title IV-E foster care maintenance payments. The child-care institution becomes eligible for Federal financial participation when it comes into full compliance with the State's licensing standards.

Kinship Bill: Parental Child Safety Placement Program



SB 39: Parental Child Safety Placement Program

- Establishes a Parental Child Safety Placement Program for children placed with kin/fictive kin.
- Prevents unnecessary entry into foster care
- Volunteer program between the agency and the parent to establish services in the best interest of the child.


